

## ALLIES CONTINUE ADVANCE

On 15 D Day was the high spot of last week's war news. Launched on a vast scale with more than 900 surface craft, hundreds of troop carrying planes, airborne infantry and paratroopers the show went off without a hitch. This group, together with the 55th Wing bombed bridges far to the north of the actual invasion and our crews saw little of the invasion. Since then the beachheads on two main points between Nice and Marsailles have been greatly strengthened and nourished by undiminished supplies. Great Nationalistic note struck by French in that it was first time since fall of France that French troops were fighting on their own soil against foreign foe. We are reaching out towards the key harbor town of Toulon, just east of Marsailles, and have reached approaches directly to famed French city. Drive has now encircled Toulon from the east but further solidation of noose expected as we move west and then tuck in to coast. At any rate the south coast invasion being strengthened hourly and apparently moving with surprisingly little resistance. Key to this encouraging picture was supplied largely by 15th AAF with 55th Wing playing vital part in knocking out major gun installations overlooking beaches as well as fortifying bridges and supply roads focalizing on central France and webbing to the south. Marsailles completely forced from outside. As first we directly against valuable harbor of Toulon we knocked out Nazi claimed battleship Strassbourg, formerly of French Navy and scuttled by French in '42 when Germans took over major portion of their sea power. ### The Nature of Free Man

The main question is why did world war recur so soon? Rather than take a firm stand with the aggressor nations the democracies sacrificed China, Ethiopia and Czechoslovakia. As late as 1936 the power of the now United Nations would have easily checked the Axis if they had acted together. The reoccupation of the Rhineland, and the advance of the Axis policy of piecemeal aggression strengthened the fascist nations until the large democracies were in serious peril.

If England had fallen in 1940, America would not have been able to face the Axis alone. We were unprepared. Our conduct between the two wars was folly. We took freedom for granted. When a nation relaxes, it begins to go backwards. Americans refused to believe in danger. Even when ten nations on the continent of Europe were killed, one by one, we refused to learn from their example. They had made the same mistakes we made after World War I. They paid a more terrible price for those mistakes simply because they lived closer to the aggressor nations.

Born in an age of constant and great mechanical progress we developed the delusion that the world automatically improves with the passage of time. We mistook mechanical triumphs for the essence of world progress. This conception was disastrous. Fine progress has very nearly been the tool for carrying out the destruction of civilization. We



other directions. Thus during invasion week. Ship knocked out on Friday. Toulon harbor intact to us, as we planned.

With point of sturdy campaign we reached Trieste when allied forces, infantry and air force had taken over a mighty by road. The French followed, reaching, roughly 12 miles between Tolosa and Armentier, the outskirts of Paris, which was but used by them to stage in a rather desperate attempt to extricate the remnants of his 7th army from a scene butchering. The German railroads doin a shrewd job of getting out much of his men and equipment. Yesterday, however, tried to open a mass plan while all roads seaward were blocked with German troops, allied planes interrupted the refineries on a giant scale. Estimates of total damage inflicted this sector as well as road from Chartres to Rouen (11 miles from Paris) is hard to best but count about 100 trucks and 70 tanks destroyed. This was done in last 24 hours. German retreat has turned into shambles in last two days and allied commanders firing every bullet of medaling out into complete annihilation. Paris is taken on all approaches of Montlhéry town which it should wary shortly. All communications and major transportation lines have shut down and Nazi attempt to keep intact in check seem to be failing.

Developments on "Soviet" front we been far less spectacular this week but Soviets have been moving up supplies and strengtheners on all vital parts of eastern front. Much heavy fighting still week in Estonia where armored forces and infantry are driving to cut the state completely off, completely encircled of Nazi built in that land and do considerable liquidating. Just to south the big concern Russian troops and tanks which has crossed into Latvia and now forming are acting on their own soil and beginning to burn down towns to forestall American drive. Further to south troops have been fighting on east bank of Vistula river where crossings are being launched. Entire future river operation of great lines moving into second year towards a history ending late August and September.

THE NATURE OF FREE MAN (cont from excused our aloofness from the war before Pearl Harbor with the phrase, "War settles nothing." In reality, war settles which side shall have a chance to get its own way. We missed the opportunity to use victory in 1919 for world good.

Armistice day will bring the desire to forget and to relax. Yet we must be prepared to continue the struggle to preserve freedom and peace, a struggle which has no end. The moral of the past twenty-five years is clear. We must not repeat the mistake of believing that the mere winning of the war finishes our job. Our immediate task in America after the war is to adhere to the democratic principle of open-mindedness, and to exercise the democratic rights. We must fear false leadership and false ideas.
