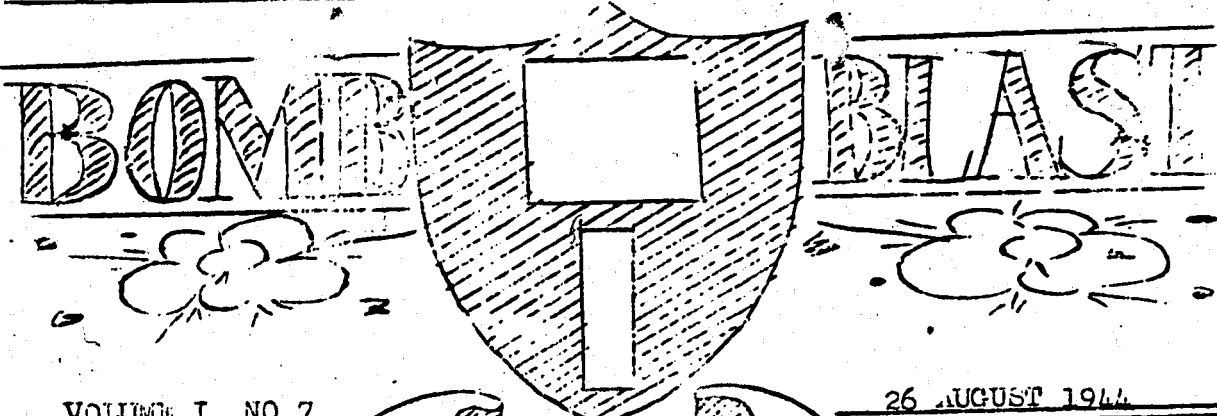


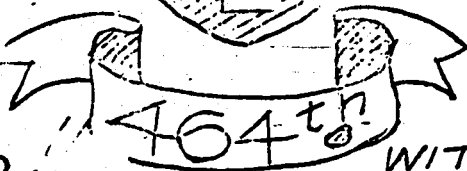

WHAT'S WRONG  
WITH THE GERMANS?

The Allied War Machine continued to run on all cylinders as it smashed ahead in France. The Germans found themselves facing a blitzkrieg touched with lightning speed and power.

In a little more than a week after their landing in Southern France, Allied Forces have fanned out to control principal parts of the coast. Toulon, Marseilles and other ports fell before the advancing troops or were seized from within by the people themselves. Not content with this, fast moving armoured forces struck northward and were within sight of Lyons, Trojan-bursed by the French Forces of the Interior. Another steel claw reached out and clamped itself on the outlets of the Italian front which can now only be supplied through the mountain passes of Austria.

But the real weight fell from the North, as Patton's steel tracked patrols raced forwards, bypassed Paris and aimed for the German border a hundred miles away. Meanwhile the Canadians dashed through from Troarn and dashed the Germans back to the line, pocketing the battered remnants of the once proud German 7th Army.

Paris, declared liberated by the FFI, called for help three days later to prevent the city from coming under complete German control and French Armour lead the dash to save the last bit of girl laughter of Gay Paree.

The Russians fought to a standstill by the Germans in the north, struck quickly and savagely to the south, taking Jazy and striking into Rumania. King Michael called for a break with Germany and to form a new government to fight on the side of the allies. While all this was going on the Red Tide was rough-

What's wrong with the Germans? Why do they persist in making war in spite of recurrent defeat? Are they different than other peoples? Do they enjoy death and destruction?

From the history of the German nation we can gather some inkling of their philosophy.

In 1869, the famous historian and political philosopher von Treitschke wrote: "That war should ever be banished from the world is a hope not only absurd, but profoundly immoral. It would involve the atrophy of many of the essential and sublime forces of the human soul and transform the globe into a vast temple of egoism."

The great von Bulow, Chancellor of the Kaiser's Reich, announced: "To the hypocritical French slogan of Liberty, Equality, Fraternity, we oppose our Prussian realities, of Infantry, Cavalry, Artillery."

Now any country in the world can develop and has developed men who can write in the same vein, but are there many people who would believe stuff like that? Do we believe that might makes right? Do we believe that minorities are of an inferior calibre? Of course not. Then why the difference? Are we different biologically? No! That is not the answer. The difference in philosophies between the German and any democratic people can in all cases be traced back to their teachings.

For centuries the Prussians have been inciting the Germans to violence. The armies, Navies, and recently Air Forces have been glorified to such an extent that Germans who are extremely humane have found themselves with strong urges to join in the warmongering. The warrior is supreme! Those poor unfortunates who disapprove are disgraced! Pacifism is synonymous with cowardice! And once in the service a war must be had at all costs to prove the worth of this sabre-rattling. (Con't on Pg 8)

## s COMMENTARY

The lapses into irregularity of uniform has been too prevalent of late. Too many men have acquired the impression that being stationed overseas is justification for relaxation of military discipline. The following regulations will be observed:

1. Officers will be in Class A uniform at all times except when participating in recreation or athletics.
  2. If a regulation shirt is worn, it is part of a Class A uniform, therefore such personnel will be in Class A uniform (including cap), sleeves rolled down and buttoned, shirt tucked inside of trousers and trouser leg unrolled.
  3. Administration clerks will be in Class A uniform at all times during duty hours.
  4. When on work detail, enlisted personnel may wear a "T" shirt in place of regulation shirt if they desire.
  5. Athletic clothing may be worn by enlisted personnel when actively participating in sports.
- Any covering desired may be worn by personnel going to and from showers.

If victory is given into our hands let us rise above the expression of primitive instincts, above the level of those who would destroy us and deal with them even as we would have them deal with us.

It is better to build than destroy and more profitable to redeem than kill.

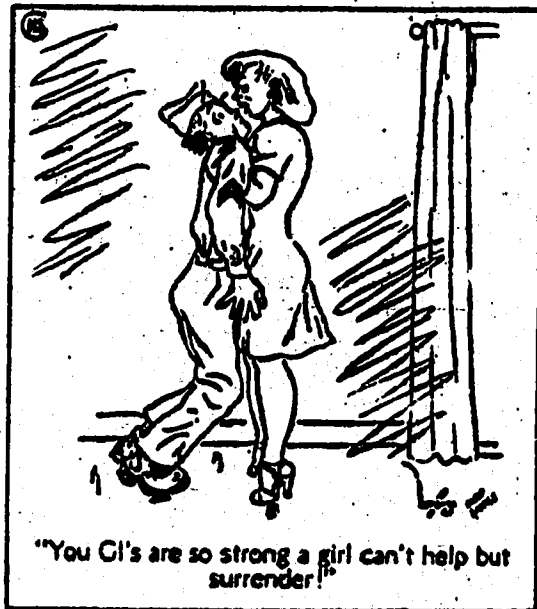
**GUAM (CNS)** -----Civilian residents of Guam got a peculiar picture of the war from the Japs during the Japanese occupation of this island.

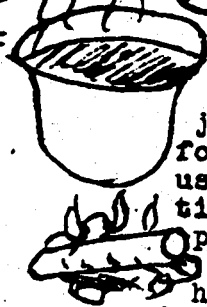
**FREEMAN**, famous member of the four horseman team called femine, rides again. Cooks complain, "He's always first in line, and when he eats first, there isn't enough for all."

**JOE LOUIS**

Last time I saw Joe Louis at the Polo Grounds in August '42...He'd been in uniform nearly a year...It was Sunday....a war bond jamboree with baseball, jimie walker, billy rose overtones plus an overall backdrop of parading menagerie of the sports and entertainment world. Louis' part consisted of three shuffling rounds with his massive sparring mate, George Nicholson, with Louis for years and, until two weeks ago, indestructible as ebony. For his last title bout Louis weighed 206.....yesterday he weighed 216 but it seemed the type of suet he could burn off in three weeks of hard work.

A lot of guys wonder about how Louis adds up in this war picture. Until recently Louis has also been trying to figure that riddle. But this is cert-

ain. He didn't ask for the job that Uncle Sam designed for him, any more than most of us in this group. It was a long time before he could sell his part in the war to Joe as anything but short. One look at him and you know he doesn't relish the idea of trying to be a trained barking seal.

England and his pre-invasion barnstorming convinced him he's playing a part - a solid part.

"For two weeks before the invasion I worked eight shows a day for the invasion boys. They seemed to eat it up...same with the hospitals.....men and boys what is wounded seem to like to talk with somebody what dont talk too much...that's me."

Apparently, these soldiers that he's tried to entertain have shown Louis what a tonic he represents.....a tonic where a guy can look him over, talk with him and say to himself, "Man for man - that guy is honest murder."

Louis' troupe has been on the road since Aug. 30, 1943.... covered 48 states, the British Isles, North Africa and now finishing up on Italy before heading into the far East.

Louis says the best heavy-weight prospect he's seen is a youngster Billy Conn has in England.

Louis is as tired as the rest of us concerning overseas as against home.

He'll fight until his legs tell him he can't..but the pins feel good. "Folks all the time tellin' or writin' that I'll be too old when this war is over," he mused. "I'm 30... I say it's not how old a man is it's how he lives."
